

RAHWAY DAY FESTIVAL 2014

Unlike the cold and rainy day of our debut appearance at the first annual Rahway Festival in May 2012, May 3rd this year dawned clear and mild. The intensive planning and the gallant dedication of Chamber of Commerce volunteers were everywhere evident. Everyone with whom we spoke reported "no problems" in setting up their stations. We of NJERHS enjoyed the support and cooperation of the Rahway Library staff in particular. Our display was stored securely in the library basement on Friday evening, the only day that Bob Hooper's vehicle was available to transport our exhibit materials. They also stored same Saturday evening until Monday when Bob was able to perform the pickup.

Ira Deutsch and I arrived at the library lobby at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 3rd, and with the help of library Senior Maintainer Gary Jack we were set up and ready to greet visitors by 10:00 a.m. The weather further encouraged a Many people visited our table, gratifying turnout. observed the Rahway trolley performing its figure eight route and accepted printed material in the form of fliers, membership applications and postcards. Countless children rang the trolley bell to the delight of all within earshot.

At about 11:00 a.m., Senator Booker made his appearance. He approached our table and expressed interest in our display. We of course presented him with a prepared packet of information regarding the Graw Yard Heritage Park site, which he graciously accepted and expressed interest in examining. 
After a long winter's hibernation, we spring into a vigorous new round of activities for 2014.














UL: The Jersey Central Chapter NRHS once again produced their annual Mother Seton H.S. show in Clark on the first Sunday in March, affording NJERHS yet another opportunity to advance book and photo sales and solicit new members, yielding the highest return yet. Holding down our table were Ira Deutsch (I) and Bob Hooper, without, for the first time in many years, the invaluable presence of our late friend, Frank Miklos. *Tony Hall photo, 2 March 2014*. UR: East bonnet of 2651 is removed for further work. MR: Detail of the stiffening and strengthening modifications made to the bonnet. ML, LL, LR: Hank Kaminski fashions a template to be used in routing the recession into which the newly fabricated strengthening bars will be fitted. *All other photos by Bob Hooper, 2 February 2014*.



UL: Temporary retaining planks are clamped to the bonnet so that it will maintain its proper curvature during its replacement atop the east end platform. UR: Pressure is exerted across the back of the bonnet so that the curvature will remain correct. ML: Jim Tomczyk makes final adjustments to one of the stiffening bars he will fit into the bonnet base. MR: Hank makes fine cuts to the recession into which the stiffening plate will be fitted. NJERHS appeared at the Caldwell Library in a commemoration of the 29 Bloomfield Avenue trolley service abandoned 60 years ago.





UR: In his presentation remarks, Bob Markman extolled the skill of the recently deceased Mr. Deschenes (1932 – 2013) and displayed a recent photograph of the builder. New Jersey's representation in the Collection has been growing recently, as the views on this page demonstrate. Space limitations prevent comment on each image, except to note NJERHS members Jack May (top center) and Andrew Burger (top right). Second row, Ex-NJT PCC # 25 is one of the most recent arrivals and is scheduled for restoration in the near future. To those of us of a certain age, the recently restored H&M black car (third row, left to right) defined trans-Hudson rapid transit service for numerous decades. The ex-Public Service trailer # 4584 was rescued from use as an office at Miehle's sheet metal works on Rt. 22E in Springfield, where it had served for many decades. Restoration work is in progress. The ex-TTC sweeper, while not technically a New Jersey car, is similar to the one held by NJERHS in secure storage out of state. BR: A mouthwatering hot lunch was served up by the BERA volunteers.
